May 16th is also the date for "Spring Fling", the Dundee Merchants Association's annual street fair. This "family friendly" event will include an amateur barbecue competition, kid's rides, a fire truck and ambulance to explore, and also a cookie decorating competition for the kids. Underwood Avenue will be closed and there will be the traditional beer garden with music until 11 pm...the beer garden will close at 11:30 pm. Rumor has it that a Mayor of Dundee will be elected that day who will lead the parade on "Dundee Day" in August; watch for more details later. Also on the downtown Dundee news scene, the folks who operate Johnny's Café on "L" Street have taken over the Trovato's space and may even be open by "Spring Fling" No other details are currently available but it certainly is great to welcome them to our part of town and to wish them all our best.

Midtown Neighborhood Alliance Report

The Midtown Neighborhood Alliance held its annual meeting on March 18th at the Field Club. Judy Alderman from Bemis Park NA was elected to a two year term as President. Jim Farho from Blackstone NA was recognized for his four years of service as President.

The Re-Tree Midtown Committee has completed work on grant applications for Mutual of Omaha, OPPD and the Mayor's Office in addition to the Kiewit Foundation application that was completed last month. These grants will fund the six pilot projects to replace trees in Midtown Omaha. The pilot project for DMPA is on 52nd Street, Underwood Ave. to Cass St. If the funding comes through, the plan is to have the trees planted by this October. If these pilot projects are successful, it is the plan of MNA to continue with this effort for additional locations in MNA neighborhoods.

Update on Infinite Store at 52nd & Leavenworth

The liquor license application for the Infinite store at 30th & Lake, which the City Council approved in January, was withdrawn when Attorney General Bruning confirmed that his office was investigating the applicant, Singh Brothers, Inc., for possible criminal activity. The same Singh Brothers, Inc. had also planned to lease the 52nd & Leavenworth store and apply for a liquor license according to the corporation's law firm, Kelley & Jerram. The current owner of the property has said that he is selling the stores but no commercial listings have yet been found for this property. The concern is that he will "sell" the store to another relative at an inflated price and continue running the stores in the manner they have been run the past year. The building does have graffiti that has not been removed and the inside of the store has food and merchandise on the floor.

Lately I have become reacquainted with a couple of old friends. The old friends in this case, are paint brushes. Normally even I wouldn't think of inanimate objects as friends, but these two brushes have

been with me for more than 25 years. So pulling them out the other day reminded me to remind you to invest in quality tools and then—just like your best friends—they'll never let you down.

These two brushes are made by Purdy and are available at most paint stores and some of the "big box" home improvement stores. With a little care—always completely clean your brushes and store them properly—they will last and last. More important they will give you better results and less frustration. The quality of brush you use is as important to getting a good final finish as is the quality of the paint or varnish you use. (And don't skimp on the quality of paint and varnish either.)

Although I have a pretty extensive collection of paint brushes of different sizes, shapes and bristle composition, these are the two that I go back to more than any of the others. One is a 2 ½-inch nylon bristle brush with a square cut. This is my all-around utility player. I use it for applying both latex and oil primers and paints. I find the 2 ½-inch size is just about right for almost every job. One of the most common mistakes I see with do-it-yourself painters is that they work with a brush that is too small. The small brushes don't hold much paint and cover only a small area, so you're laying down a lot of strokes and working way too hard. Also, it is hard to get a smooth, even finish with narrow strokes. If I am doing a really big job like exterior siding or big sheets of plywood I'll grab my four-inch wide nylon bristle brush.

My other favorite is a 3-inch China bristle brush also with a square cut. China bristle is a natural bristle made from hog's hair. (But who would buy a hog's hair brush, thus by clever marketing it has been renamed China bristle. It's just like the slimehead fish. Would you order that in a restaurant? Probably not. But you will eat the same fish with more palatable name, orange roughy.)

I use the China bristle brush exclusively for applying varnishes or polyurethanes with mineral spirits bases. China bristles are not good for water-based finishes because they will swell up into a blobby mass. I prefer the 3-inch wide brush because it is big enough to cut a decent swath on wide baseboards and doors, but not so big that it is unwieldy. You could also use the China bristle brush for applying oilbased stains, but I just use any old junky brush. Because you will be wiping off the excess stain with a cloth anyway, it doesn't matter how smoothly you apply the stain. This way I keep my more expensive varnishing brushes clean and in good shape.

Speaking of clean, properly cleaning a good brush will extend its life indefinitely. I know, after hours of painting cleaning up just seems like a pain-in-the-neck (or lower). But don't shortcut the cleanup. For water-based finishes put the brush under a running faucet and work the bristles with your fingers until the water runs clear. Tip up the brush vertically from time to time so the running water gets all the way to the heel of the brush. For oil paints and other mineral spirits based finishes find an empty tin can and fill it with paint thinner enough to cover the bristles. Swirl the brush through the thinner several times and dump the thinner (I put mine into an empty one gallon plastic container and reuse it later). Replace it with fresh thinner, swirl, dump, and then repeat one more time for a total of three washes. And again, point the brush upwards a few times so the thinner makes its way to the heel.

Invest a few bucks in a brush spinner (available at paint, hardware or the "big box" stores). As your final cleaning step press the brush handle into the clamps at the end of the spinner and give the spinner handle a few quick in and out strokes. Because centrifugal force is going to spin any remaining finish and solvent out of your brush, stick the end of the spinner into a plastic bucket (I have an empty drywall compound bucket that works perfectly) to catch the spray.

After cleaning put your brush back into the cardboard or plastic sleeve that it came in. Either lay the brush flat or hang it up by its handle. Don't store brushes standing up on their bristles, because this will distort the bristles over time. And, hey, you wouldn't do this to old friends would you? After all, they are likely to be your companions for decades to come.


