April showers?

In the meantime, let's enjoy Spring. Looking to take a walk on a warm afternoon? Stop by the Dundee Garden to find out what's being planted this year. It's been a pleasure to watch the garden "grow" up – and become quite a mainstay of our neighborhood. Not only giving apartment dwellers a place to garden, but also giving back – through donated produce and education on horticulture topics. This is one spot where you can really see April showers bring May flowers! Thanks DCG President Mary Green, VP and Secretary Eric Williams, and Treasurer Murphy Larson - and to all the DCG gardeners for your contributions.

Concerned about the rain? At our March monthly neighborhood meeting, stucco and plaster expert Dick Grace recommended caulking your home immediately. As Dick said, "when the birds fly north, seal it up." Mr. Grace was referring to the idea that April has traditionally been a very wet month. His advice was to get some good clear silicone sealant or calk and look for any cracks or gaps on your house. Specifically, focus around the windows or doors. Water getting behind the siding or stucco can really cause big problems.

Do you have some round-to-its? You know, those little repair projects that you are going to get "around to it" some day. These are not the projects that are so big that you absolutely have to deal with them RIGHT NOW! These

are the small little projects that are the minor annoyances of old house living. I don't know about you, but I carry a pretty sizable list of those "round-to-it" projects in my head.

This month we'll take a look at a couple of repair questions posed by readers of this column. They sound like "round-to-it" projects to me. Maybe these same projects are on your list.

Hi, I live in Dundee South. I have a rather weird question to ask you. I have an old drain in the basement that has that slope down to it. When I do a lot of wash (my washer & dryer are down there) the water will come up into the laundry room once in a while if I don't keep putting Drano into it. It will come up about 3-4 feet (close to the drain, not across the whole room or anything). It always goes down but it kind of drives me nuts.

Is that a problem with the sewer and water lines being together in this part of town, is the drain too small in the basement, or what? If you can help me on this I would appreciate it. Thanks so much--

Hi, Nancy....

Based on the information you've given me, I think your problem is caused by a partial blockage in the sewer line. It may be due to a buildup of grease (if the kitchen sink drains into the same line) and fibers from washing clothes. A clear two-inch pipe is sufficient to handle the discharge from a washer and I'm guessing your drain line is at least that or larger. But a clothes washer pumps out a high volume of water under pressure and it doesn't take much of a blockage to cause a back up.

A clue that it's not the pipe size that's causing the problem is that when you add Drano everything drains properly (for awhile anyway). Chemicals are not likely to be satisfactory permanent solution. I would recommend you get the line snaked and flushed out by a plumber or "Roto-Rooter" type of company. The plumber should use a spade tip (not just a small auger) to really clean out the inside of the line. Then I would recommend flushing the line with a 1/2 gallon of bleach and several pans of boiling water. I don't recommend harsh drain cleaning chemicals because they are very hard on plumbing--especially old pipes.

Another culprit of slow drains is a blocked or partially blocked stack. The stack is the pipe (usually cast iron in old houses) that extends vertically through your house and vents out of the roof. The purpose of the stack is to allow gases to escape and promote proper drainage by drawing in air. But after years of service the stack can get clogged up, especially if you have large trees near the house. You might ask the plumber who augers out the drain about checking the stack and if it needs to be cleaned out, it may be cheaper to have it augered out at the same time as the floor drain. I hope this helps. Good luck.

This question was left on my voicemail: "How do I remove smoke stains from the brick surrounding the exterior of my fireplace?

The best way to restore smoke-stained masonry is with a series escalating attacks rather than an all-out assault. What I mean is--try the gentlest solution and if that's not successful, work your way up with harsher measures.

For the first attempt try using a gum eraser. Often you can just erase away light smoke stains.

For moderate stains that won't yield to the eraser try scrubbing with a TSP (Trisodium Phosphate) solution. Mix 8 ounces of TSP in a gallon of hot water and then scrub the fireplace with a Tampeco brush. (This is natural bristle brush used in masonry work and is available in most hardware and home improvement stores.) Protect your floor and walls with plastic sheeting, but more importantly protect your eyes with safety goggles and your hands with heavy rubber gloves. After scrubbing, rinse thoroughly with clear water.

If you still haven't vanquished the stains, the last resort is an acid wash. For this step you really want to be careful to protect your eyes and skin. Goggles, chemical resistant rubber gloves and long sleeves are musts. Also make sure you have lots of ventilation. Use a fan to pull away the vapor from the acid solution. I would also recommend a mask to protect your nose and lungs.

Add 12 ounces of muratic acid to a gallon of warm water in a plastic pail. Do your mixing outside the house. Remember to add the acid to the water not the other way around. If you add water to acid the heat of the acid will cause the first drops of water to "belch" which may blow the acid out of the container and on you! Also never mix TSP and muratic acid. This will cause a violent chemical reaction. So if you are following up a TSP cleaning with an acid treatment, make sure you have thoroughly rinsed the surface.

Start washing the surface with your acid mixture from the bottom to the top with the Tampeco brush. After you are done scrubbing thoroughly rinse with clear water. After your masonry surfaces have dried for a couple of days you may want to seal the surface with a clear masonry sealer. It will make the next cleaning job a little easier.



Please Water New Trees

Over the past 7 years, over 160 new trees have been planted in Dundee-Memorial Park as part of Re-Tree Midtown at no cost to property owners. The weather is now warming up and it is critical that these young trees get good waterings as the very cold winter was once again extremely dry leaving little moisture in the soil. The first five years are critical to the survival of new trees.

If you received one of these plantings, PLEASE BE SURE TO GIVE THEM PLENTY OF WATER.
