Letter From the President

The investments in and around our neighborhood have never been stronger. Have you noticed all of the development at Nebraska Medicine – 42nd and Harney? Right now there are 3 major construction projects underway on the campus and a total investment of over \$1 billion. What's going on? How do we benefit?

First, let me provide some clarity:

The medical school located on the campus (UNMC) is one of the nation's top medical schools. It supports undergraduates and graduate students in medicine, nursing, pharmacy, and dentistry coursework. Tuition is \$28,000 a year for in-state and \$70,000 for out of state students. The school employs over 5,000 faculty/staff and has over 3,700 students enrolled. Their primary care program was recently ranked #4 in the country by U.S. News and World Report – out of 153 schools. Dr. Jeffrey Gold, MD is the Chancellor. These are great people to have around.

In addition to the school, Nebraska Medicine is also headquartered at 42nd and Harney. Nebraska Medicine is the hospital closely affiliated with UNMC. This facility houses over 600 beds and 1,000 physicians – and is the only remaining trauma care facility in Omaha. It has been ranked the top hospital in the State of Nebraska for many years in a row. (Our board member – Sara Nelson works there!)

On top of the direct investment in the school and medical facilities, there is significant peripheral investment. Two large hotels are scheduled to be built in 2016: one at 42nd and Farnam and one at 44th and Dodge. More details have yet to surface around the development plans for Saddle Creek between Dodge and Leavenworth Streets (on the west side). We do know the project will be big – likely to exceed \$100 million. Back to the current construction. The 3 big buildings going in are:

- Lauritzen Outpatient Center and Fritch Surgery Center -\$70 million building
- Lozier Center for Pharmacy Sciences and Education and Drug Discovery \$35 million building
- Fred and Pamela Buffet Cancer Center \$323 million building

Watering

We've had some questions around watering the flower baskets. When it's so rainy, why water? The trucks actually contain water AND fertilizer mixed. So, the baskets are getting water and needed nutrients. In addition, it's very difficult to schedule and change schedules due to weather – so, we don't change the schedule. Finally, some baskets get full sun. Some get partial sun. Some get full shade. Some are under heavy trees and get nearly no water – even if it rains. It's difficult to adjust to all these variables.

We do our best to get the job done with 100% unpaid volunteers – and donated equipment. There are 4 watering trucks used in Dundee to water the 400+ baskets. It usually takes about 60 people over the summer to volunteer to get the job done. The trucks are parked at "guest" homes over the summer who also fill our trucks from their own water source – often for free.

Dundee Community Garden News

The Dundee Community Garden is in full summer swing! Members are harvesting from their plots, and we've been making weekly donations of produce including rhubarb, radishes, broccoli, and a variety of greens, to the Underwood Tower across the street. Our strawberry patch was bursting with berries in June—if you haven't had a chance to pick some berries, stop by in July and see if our Everbearing plants are still producing. (Half our plants are June Bearing, and half are Everbearing.) Our strawberry patch is along the north side of the garden, by the alley and under the fruit trees.

Thanks to generous neighborhood supporters, we have purchased and installed soaker hoses in both our "Neighbor Garden" area along Underwood Ave. (where anyone walking by the garden is invited to pick a handful of produce or herbs) and in our sweet potato patch along 49th St. This should help make watering much easier this season—and help us have a more productive harvest.

Nothing beats the timeless beauty of a brick house. And nothing spoils the look of elegant brickwork like paint drips and spatters as a result of care-

less trim painting. After 70, 80 or more years and lots of paint jobs, maybe your brick exterior has more than it's share of paint spots.

Probably the best way of removing small areas of paint from brickwork is to apply a commercial paint stripper. It's better to dab the stripper on in big globs. Don't brush it back and forth that reduces the effectiveness of the stripper. Remember you are dealing with highly caustic chemicals here--lye or hydrocarbon solvents are the basis for paint removers--so wear a long sleeve shirt, chemical resistant rubber gloves and protect your eyes with goggles.

Be patient. Let the stripper work for some time until it softens and loosens the paint enough that it can be scraped off or removed by pressure from a stream of water. I would recommend limiting your stream of water to a garden hose sprayer. You can use a high pressure washer, if you exercise a great deal of caution and use a wide fan spray nozzle and keep the wand a foot or two away from the brick surface. Too much pressure can blast out old mortar and erode old, soft brick.

Sometimes a heat gun or a propane torch can soften old paint so it can be scraped from the bricks, but this works best on particularly thick paint globs. Other times paint can be successfully removed by burning it to ash and brushing it off with a wire brush.

Sometimes, despite all your best efforts, strippers will leave white shadows—hazy reminders of the original spots. Don Wells, a Dundee neighbor, sent me this slick tip he came up with for dealing with this problem:

I've been trying to clean spots of paint off of the bricks on my house. I tried paint stripper and although it works, it also leaves a white shadow that I can't remove. I don't want to try a power washer as they are very messy and can blow the grout out of joints along with the paint. I thought about painting over the spots with a brick colored paint but getting a color match is impossible and the color of the bricks varies as well. I finally came up with a solution that works pretty well. I just happen to have several bricks from the house that were removed during a previous owner's renovation. I simply chipped off a piece of brick and pounded it on a steel plate until it was fairly pulverized. I then rolled it with a piece of pipe to grind it further. I eventually ended up with a small amount of brick powder. I mixed it with glossy lacquer (I chose it because it's thick, clear and I had some lying around) and soon had paint that matched the brick perfectly. I painted it on with a very small (artist's) brush and soon, the spots were gone.

The gloss will eventually fade but it seems to match the brick better than if I used a no gloss lacquer. I'm sure you can use other clear finishes but I arbitrarily picked lacquer. Even if you don't have spare bricks, you could probably knock a chip off your house in some remote location, and make a small batch. And by small, I mean I mixed my concoction in an empty tuna can.

(This sounds like a great solution. I'm going to try this myself. Thanks.)

Another common paint-on-brick problem is paint residue on brick that is below painted shutters. This is caused by chalking of the shutter paint. For this problem try Prosoco Shure Klean Light Duty Restoration Cleaner. Locally, Prosoco products are carried by Watkins Concrete Block Company, Stetson Building Products, Lumberman's, and Larson Cement Stone Company. Although Light Duty Restoration Cleaner is considered a mild cleaner, you still need to protect plants, pets and yourself. And, do I really need to say this? Read and follow label instructions when using this or any other restoration product.






