Quickly mark your calendars for Sunday, December 7 from 4 to 6 pm for the "Lights in Dundee" Holiday Party. As this is being written, planning is still underway but it looks like this event will be of the "new and improved" variety. There will again be hayrack rides and the Central H. S. choir, as well as holiday lighting...but the Dundee Merchant's have ordered professional installation of more and brighter lights for the trees. Also new this year, several members of the Omaha Police Department Horse Patrol will be present...and best of all, Santa Claus will be there!!! And we hope he brings his camera to record the event for the kids. Overall, the Merchants have tried to make the business district a festive place to visit, shop, eat and drink.

Also back this year....if frigid weather helps out...the skating rink at the intersection of Underwood and Happy Hollow. Dig out your skates and make sure the blades are sharp so you are ready for what Dundee Bank's Jeff Royal says is an expanded rink.

The DMPA "holiday decoration review team" did its work on November 30 and the list of the "not to be missed" home decorations appears inside this newsletter. The neighborhood again looks great. Many homes have been trimmed besides those on "the list" and more are added daily, all of which help to capture the holiday spirit, so take the opportunity to drive or walk through the neighborhood and see how beautiful it is...and if we get some snow it will be even more so.

Another event, while a bit further off, but significant enough to get on your calendars early, is the January 12 Association meeting. The Dundee Merchants Association is planning a "Streetscape Enhancement" along Underwood Avenue as part of the Dundee Neighborhood Conservation and Enhancement District which currently is under discussion. The Merchants wish to involve residents in the planning of the "streetscape" so the entire Association meeting on January 12 will be devoted to this activity. The Merchants' planners will be in attendance to provide information and lead a discussion about the improvement/enhancement process. The purpose of the Conservation and Enhancement District is to encourage uses which are friendly to the neighborhood and pedestrians with guidelines based on the Omaha By Design standards. The Streetscape Project will look at street and public right of way issues including sidewalks, parking, signage, seating, trees and planters. Mark your calendars now, give these issues some thought and come prepared to join the discussion on January 12

Planning and development is not limited to just the business district. The Midtown Neighborhood Alliance, of which DMPA is a member, has asked the Omaha Planning Department to establish an Area of Civic Importance (ACI) or development overlay along Dodge Street from Saddle Creek Road to 49th Street and 51st Street to 69th Street. ACI is to apply the Omaha By Design Standards to any new construction or reconstruction which occurs in the area. You may recall that a year ago DMPA was involved in the designation of the area along Dodge Street from 49th Street to 51st Street as an ACI. While Omaha zoning standards still apply within ACIs, the new standards are intended to enhance the appearance and user friendliness of these areas. On November 3 I attended a meeting called by a representative of Destination Midtown, a midtown planning and development organization. At this meeting it was announced that Goodwill Industries intends to move their headquarters and store from its 41st and Pacific Streets location to the former Target Store on Saddle Creek Road. While the sale of the property has not been finalized, planning is well underway for Goodwill to spend about \$15 million to redevelop the property to meet their needs. The building is to include offices, a Board Room, community meeting rooms, classrooms, a cafeteria, and Donation and Retail space. Goodwill also intends to rent some portion of the south end of the building to other commercial entities.

Some of you may be curious about the development occurring south of Buchanan's BP at 50th and Dodge Streets. Steve Buchanan intends to improve the appearance of and access to the car wash on the west side of the station. He has purchased the house to the south, removed the structure, graded the lot, constructed a retaining wall and backfilled the lot to raise it to the level of the station. This is all legal activity, but in order to pave a wider driveway he must rezone the additional lot from residential to commercial. Steve applied for rezoning but the application was held over until Steve meets with his neighbors and develops a screening plan, including fences and landscaping. That activity is in process, along with compaction of the soil that will be below the new driveway.

And now, a word about the events of the evening of November 12. Many of you have spoken to me in one way or another to express your concerns about the two shootings that occurred that evening and to enquire about what is being or could be done to protect our neighborhood. I firmly believe that this violence CAME here but that we did nothing to BRING it here. As of this writing, police believe the shooting at 50th and Underwood and at 52nd and Leavenworth are connected with each other as well as with the one at 15th and Dorcas Streets and have arrested three individuals. Police say the motive appears to be robbery and, since the investigation continues, will discuss neither drug nor gang activity but do not believe the three suspects knew the victims. Is there something residents, the Dundee Merchants, the Association can do to prevent further such violence in the neighborhood? I believe we are already doing much? Witness all of the above in this column. We need to keep the neighborhood clean, attractive, free of clutter and trash, filled with families who care about each other

and their neighbors, free of activities that breed crime, well lighted, with streets and areas that are family and pedestrian friendly. For the past several months the Association, along with neighboring Associations, has opposed the granting of a liquor license to the Infinite station at 52nd and Leavenworth along with licenses for its three sister stations.

Those licenses were denied, as was reported in the November Newsletter. I have been working with a police officer who lives in the neighborhood who has offered to provide uniformed patrol in the Dundee business district during late evening weekend nights. At its meeting on November 7 the Dundee Merchants' Association voted to contract with this officer for his services. He was out of the country on November 12 and not yet under contract but the Merchants had seen a need and were attending to it. The Merchants are also adding additional lighting and cameras to the business district. Can we do more? Most importantly, I urge you not to panic. Be observant; call 911 if you observe something that is out of the ordinary; report graffiti immediately to 911 or the Mayor's Hot Line. This is a strong and resilient neighborhood. With the aid of the Omaha Police Department, I believe we have it within us to keep Dundee/Memorial Park not only Historic but Safe!

Dundee Business Liaison Report

IT'S BEGINNING TO LOOK A LOT LIKE CHRISTMAS

The merchants have contracted with Bright Ideas to help light the trees this year, and the new lights will be turned on at 5:00 pm Sunday as part of Lights on Dundee. Santa Claus will be at the Creighton Medical Associates, carolers and choirs will be performing, a hay rack ride is being organized to look at neighborhood decorations, and hot cocoa and cider will be served at The Dell. The shops are getting ready for your arrival and will have specials to get you into the holiday mood. Bring your kids and spend some time downtown on the 7th.

Dundee Security

The neighborhood has been abuzz recently with a rash of violence. I know it seems like it is too close for comfort, but understand that other than the shooting at 50th and

Underwood what Dundee is seeing is not much different than any other neighborhood in Omaha right now. A friend owns a security business and tells me that there has been a significant increase in neighborhood crimes across Omaha lately. He warns that as we approach Christmas, everyone needs to be vigilant about locking your doors, keeping presents from view of open windows, and keep outside lights on after dark. In addition the local businesses have hired Erik the Policeman to patrol the neighborhood after dark on weekends and other selected evenings. He has been patrolling on his own for the last several weeks and has been able to keep a few minor incidents from getting out of hand, and has now been hired by the Merchant's Association to continue the patrols.

Perhaps you're like me and you have a hidden stash of old house parts. Mine are jammed into an old cabinet in the basement. It's an eclectic collection of rusty lamp parts, door hinges that

have lost their mates, broken glass door knobs, and---well, you get the idea. And someday I'm going to clean up this mess. I promise.

I also have the digital equivalent of my old house parts cabinet—a computer file where I stick odds 'n ends of ideas for old house repair and renovation. This is the month when I clean out a few energy saving ideas, a few safety tips and a follow-up item.

Energy Saver #1:

If you have a forced air furnace, change the air filter once a month. Not only will you save valuable energy, but a filter change will reduce airborne dust and make your house smell nicer.

Safety Tip #1:

Unfortunately it seems that every winter there is a news story about a family who is overcome by carbon monoxide poisoning. Promise me you won't be that family.

I thank my friend Bill Gaughan for reminding me to remind you to buy a carbon monoxide detector or two. CO detectors are inexpensive and require no more installation than plugging them in. But no alarm is a substitute for sane and sensible habits. I wrote a column a year ago about avoiding the dangers of carbon monoxide. You can access it online at http://www.dundee-memorialpark.org/. Look in the "Old House Mechanic" archive under "Hazards".

Energy Saver #2:

You probably threw an extra blanket on the bed for these cold winter nights, so how about wrapping your water heater in a blanket? About 15% of your home's utility bill goes toward heating water. Water heater blankets are inexpensive and the payback is quick.

Safety Tip #2:

Consider adding a Ground Fault Circuit Interrupter (GFCI) outlet for your clothes washer. If there is an electrical short in your washer usually the circuit breaker will trip or the fuse will blow. But they may not act fast enough to protect you from a fatal electrical shock. A GFCI outlet is more sensitive and acts faster. Modern building codes require GFCI for any outlet within six feet of water (a sink, for example). In most of our old homes the clothes washer is in the basement where the floor may be wet, so I think a GFCI outlet is prudent no matter how close or far away the sink is. If you install the GFCI outlet yourself make sure it is properly grounded. If you're not sure what properly grounded is, hire an electrician.

Follow-up

Recent Old House Mechanic columns on old windows produced some welcome emails and phone calls from people who restore them. So here are their names and contact information. I have every reason to believe these are fine, upstanding repair persons, but I do not have personal experience working with them. So before hiring one of them, do as you should do before hiring anyone to work on your old house, perform your due diligence and check their references.

Midtown Neighborhood Alliance

The Re-Tree Midtown Committee continues work on developing a program to help replace trees that have been lost or damaged by disease or recent storms. The committee met with a representative of the Nebraska Statewide Arboretum about how they can help our efforts. 

If You Get Burned This Holiday

By now you've enjoyed your Thanksgiving meal and may be already planning what to prepare for Christmas. As you slave over a hot stove and warm yourself by the fire, keep in mind a few common sense principles about burns.

How you treat a burn depends on its severity. A first degree burn is what you see with a sunburn--redness with some swelling and pain. The outer layer of skin is unbroken. Soak the burned area under cool water for five minutes to stop the burn and decrease swelling. Do not use ice, oil, or butter on the wound as this may make the burn worse. Unless this minor type of burn is large or involving your face, hands, or feet, you may treat this at home with an aloe vera product or other topical cream for pain relief. Wear loose clothing or protect the area with a dry gauze bandage. An over-the-counter medicine such as acetaminophen (brand name Tylenol) or ibuprofen (such as Advil or Motrin) will help with the pain. First degree burns take 3-6 days to heal.

Second degree burns are burns which involve the deeper layer of skin (the dermis). If blisters are present, you have a second degree burn. These burns are often extremely red, splotchy and painful, and a doctor's visit is recommended. Soak the burn in cool water. If the wound

is small, put cool, wet cloths on the burn for a few minutes daily. Then apply a prescription antibiotic cream and cover the burn with a dry, nonstick dressing held in place with gauze. Get a tetanus booster if you haven't had one recently. Monitor it daily for signs of infection such as a foul odor, swelling, pus, or red streaks travelling away from the wound. Don't fall into the temptation of breaking the blisters as the area will be more vulnerable to infection. Second degree burns take 10-21 days to heal. Third degree burns are a medical emergency. These involve all layers of the skin and because the nerves are damaged, these burns are painless. They can appear dry and white or pearly; others may be black and charred. These burns may affect the fat, muscle, and bone; the scar tissue that forms can cause the loss of function and sensation of the area. If you have a painless burn which is deep, go to the hospital immediately! Do not remove burnt clothing or immerse large severe burns in cold water as this may cause you to lose a lot of fluid and go into shock. Third degree burns require hospitalization for intravenous fluids, antibiotics, and a surgical procedure called a skin graft.
