President's Message

his is March, the month where it sometimes feels like its Spring but often feels like it is still Winter. But February felt like that...one day I washed windows...outside...a couple of days later it snowed...eight inches. I'm confused...so let me remind you that some of us are pushing the envelope and meeting at Indian Creek Nursery to plant our well known flower baskets on March 13 and 14. The lunches will be terrific, with Mark's and Dario's serving up delicious treats. There is still time to get in on the fun...call Millie Miller, 558-6023...she still may have room on her lists for a few volunteers...and Dan Rock is already making plans for his crews to hang baskets and begin watering in early May.

Another sign of spring is the early planning that is going on for "Spring Fling", the Association's "Garage Sale Weekend" and "Dumpster Day". "Spring Fling", the Dundee Merchants Association's annual street fair, will be held this year on May 16. The Merchants' goal is to "make it fun for families". Garry Ruliffson, an Energy Solutions Specialist with OPPD, presented an informative slide show and discussion concerning ways to conserve energy, and therefore money, while heating and cooling older homes. He demonstrated numerous means and materials with which to accomplish energy savings. We also were among the first to meet Captain Keith Harris, the newly installed Precinct Captain for the Northwest Precinct, who had been on duty for a full week at that point. Captain Harris summarized recent violent crimes that have affected the neighborhood and then went on to warn neighbors about more recent situations. People have been circulating through the neighborhood, ostensibly to sell magazines or some other item, but occasionally, when not finding anyone at home, going to a less visible door and breaking in. message, do not open the door if you do not recognize the person and instead, call 911. As I was writing this President's message someone rang our doorbell. We did not answer since we did not recognize the person and figured he would just leave, or, if he attempted to enter, we could contact the police. Momentarily, two squad cars arrived and two officers questioned the man and a second person who was calling at another home. I learned later that five people had called the police within twenty minutes and the officers had staked out the area. Eventually, upon not being able to show a city permit to solicit in the area, and having been checked out via police radio, the two individuals were told to leave the area and to stop ringing doorbells.

Why do I describe this situation in such detail? Several news stories were concurrently being presented due to the approaching anniversary of the slayings at the Hunter home on North 54th Street. Reporters asked me to describe what people in the neighborhood were thinking. I told them I didn't know...how could I know...but I told them I could talk about what I was thinking. I said we are all concerned for our safety because we, like the Hunters, do not know why this event had happened. What had caused someone, on that quiet, early spring afternoon, in one of the safest and most friendly neighborhoods in Omaha, to slay two individuals, for no apparent reason. I also said that many of us, due to this event, had learned to not tolerate strangers ringing our door bells or moving in a suspicious or mysterious fashion through the neighborhood. I went on to say that I and my neighbors enjoy our neighborhood and, like the Hunters, do not wish to move. We will not be intimidated nor frightened away. We will do what is necessary to maintain the friendliness, beauty, comfort and safety of the place we call home. We will move on from this event, with troubled souls and renewed care for our friends and neighbors, to continue to be involved in activities and events that make this neighborhood one of Omaha's finest.

CALENDAR ALERT!!! The agreement with the sculptor has been signed and construction is underway. The sculpture, entitled "Ascension", to be installed this spring in the central planter in the Rose Garden in Memorial Park is to be dedicated on June 6 at 10 am. You may recall that DMPA received money from an anonymous donor some years ago to shepherd the installation of a centerpiece for the Rose Garden, as a gift to the city. This piece is the result of our search.

The next Association meeting will be held on March 9 in the usual location, the dining room at Dundee Presbyterian Church. The social time (coffee, punch and cookies) begins at 7:00 pm with the formal meeting beginning at 7:30. The program this month is a Candidate Forum, in preparation for the primary election for Mayor and City

Council seats which will be held on April 7. Often, before previous elections, we have had candidates deliver brief speeches outlining the salient points of their positions. We expect a large number of candidates this year and so we are trying a new format. Instead of brief, individual statements, we will have the candidates sit as a panel, to address questions developed and selected by a moderator, Board member Anne Camp. We intend to keep the discussion focused on topics of most concern to the neighborhood. You will have an opportunity at the meeting to write your questions on cards which Anne will then have available to address to the candidates. Or, if you wish, you may e-mail your questions to me in advance. As of this writing, I have received positive responses to invitations to the event from ten candidates; three for Mayor, two for Council District 1 and five for District 3. Portions of Districts 1 and 3 are included in the Dundee/Memorial Park neighborhood. I expect this to be an exciting and well attended meeting. You'all come.

Midtown Neighborhood Alliance Report

he Midtown Neighborhood Alliance met on February 18th at the Neighborhood Center. The 2009 MNA Annual Meeting will be held on Wednesday, March 18th at 6:30 pm at the Field Club of Omaha (36th & Woolworth Ave). This event is open to all residents and will be an opportunity to see what is happening in all of the neighborhoods that make up the Midtown Neighborhood Alliance. A new President and Secretary will be elected in March for two year terms. Jim Farho (Blackstone) will be stepping down as President and Cynthia Schuck (Gifford Park) will be leaving as Secretary.


The budget for 2009 was approved and the books have been submitted for the annual audit by an independent CPA. The results should be presented at the March meeting. The Re-Tree Midtown Committee has submitted a grant application to the Kiewit Foundation for \$10,000 and additional grant applications will be completed in the coming weeks for additional funds for this project to replace trees in Midtown. Four pilot projects, including 52nd Street (Cass to Underwood) in Dundee, have been submitted as part of the Kiewit grant. If the grant is approved, the goal is to have trees in the ground this fall.

More projects will be completed as funds become available. Please let me know if you have a block that would be interested in participating in future plantings. All trees must be planted on the right of way.

Finally, the MNA board voted unanimously to support LB 605 which was introduced by Senator Gwen Howard. This bill would give neighborhoods a bigger voice on liquor license applications and address some problems with the licensing process. MNA will be testifying in favor of the bill at the public hearing in the Legislature.

"Der spring is sprung Der grass is riz I wonder where dem boidies is?"

Those lines of an anonymously written poem have been stuck in my head since I first read them in junior high. They come back to me every year as a kind of salute to spring. And now that spring has sprung, it's not only the time to start cutting the grass that has "riz" but also to inspect the exterior of your old house.

One of your tasks should be to check for mildew on the painted parts of your house. The eaves on my detached garage are particularly prone to mildew growth because the garage is located where there isn't much air movement on two sides.

Mildew is a fungal growth that shows up as big black and/or purple stains. If you're not sure whether the stains are mildew or dirt, spray some household bleach (like Clorox) on the stain and let it sit for 20 minutes or so. If the stain fades, it's mildew, because bleach has no effect on dirt.

You need to eradicate the mildew not only because it looks bad, but because—left unchecked—it can lead to wood rot. Don't try to paint over mildew because it will continue to grow and in a short time come through the paint layer. Then removing the mildew will be more difficult.

There are specific products on the market that work quite well for removing mildew. You can buy them at any hardware or home improvement store. Or you can use bleach and water. Add four parts of water per one part of household bleach. Apply the bleach and water solution to the mildewed areas with a scrub brush and let it sit for about 20 minutes and then rinse it off with a garden hose. When working with bleach protect yourself and your landscape plants. For you, wear a long sleeve shirt and long pants. Wear rubber gloves and protect your eyes with safety goggles. For your plants near the area where you are working, spray them with water before you apply your bleach solution, and then hose them off again after you're done. If the mildew is particularly tough, try another application with a stronger bleach solution.

Let the bleached area dry thoroughly (give it a couple of days) because painting over a damp surface is an invitation for peeling paint or a reoccurrence of mildew or both. When you paint, latex based paints resist mildew better than oil based paints, because they contain less of the materials mildew likes to feed on. Gloss and semi-gloss paints also resist mildew better than flat paint. Many paint manufacturers offer mildew-resistant paints. Or you can add mildewcide to your paint to help retard the return of mildew. Mildewcide is available as an inexpensive additive at any paint store. If nearby surfaces are still mildewed, avoid painting on a windy day. The mildew spores can blow onto the cleaned surface and start growing again.

I am sorry to say, that even with the proper prep and mildew-resistant paint, it is impossible to keep exterior surfaces completely free of mildew especially on northern exposures that don't get much sun. Over time it will come back. You can slow down the mildew growth by cutting back vegetation that restricts open air flow around your home. Also check gutters and downspouts for leaks or blockages.

And as you scrub away the mildew it helps to remember the entire spring poem:

"Der spring is sprung Der grass is riz I wonder where dem boidies is?

Der little boids is on der wing. Ain't dat absoid? Der little wings is on der boid!"



Memorial Park Rose Garden Needs Your Help


