# President's Message

It is a necessary tool so each neighbor is kept advised of crime details in his/her area. The Neighborhood Watch is implemented with minimal effort. We can all do that much to insure the safety of our neighborhood.

# Former Kum & Go Liquor License

at 52nd & Leavenworth was denied by the Nebraska Liquor Control Commission on April 22nd. After taking the case under advisement after the hearing on March 18th, the Commission stated that the strong opposition of Dundee-Memorial Park Association and Aksarben-Elmwood Park Neighborhood Association was a major basis for the denial. The odds were against the neighborhoods since the City Council had voted to recommend approval of the license in January. It is expected that the store owner will appeal the decision to the District Court but that will not happen for several months at the earliest. Liquor sales at the 52nd & Leavenworth store will end on April 30th.

Although this is a great victory for our neighborhood, we need to continue to keep up the pressure on the owner to maintain the property and finally install signs and remove the graffiti that he promised to do weeks ago. Four other former Kum & Go stores will go before the Liquor Control Commission in May. We will continue to support our fellow neighborhoods as they make the fight that we successfully made.

A special thanks to the Dundee-Memorial Park Association Board for their support and Dan Rock for providing the legal expertise that was crucial to our winning this decision.

# **Story of Buffett's Store**



he trait most old houses have in common is beautiful woodwork. But what if the woodwork isn't so beautiful anymore? That prompted Mary from the Josyln

Castle neighborhood to write with a question—well, actually several questions, so many questions that I'll split the answers into two columns. Here's what Mary asked:

I'm certain that our woodwork has the original vanish on it. I'm wondering why a lot of the woodwork has small raised bubbles on it. I was told it was because the wood is exposed to sunlight. Yet, the areas that are bubbled are out of the sun? I would like to refinish the wood, but am afraid of doing the wrong thing. Do you have any suggestions? I plan to use a hot air gun or should I use a varnish remover? What type of varnish remover would you recommend? What type of stain would you suggest? Also, I would like to refinish our front door. The door appears to have a very thin coating of varnish on it, so I don't think it would be difficult to remove.

I have certainly seen a lot of old varnish that has bubbled or the surface has crazed, but why it does that, I'm not precisely sure. I would suspect it is due to the chemicals that make up varnish changing over time due to the effects of temperature change and other environmental conditions. But regardless of why, it is a common problem with old woodwork.

Let me separate the woodwork from the front door, because I think they call for separate solutions. For the woodwork, before you strip off all the old finish you might try re-conditioning it. Formby's makes a product called "Conditioning Furniture Refinisher". It gently dissolves the old finish. You just wipe it on and then wipe away the old finish. Buff the surface a little and then apply a new protective top coat. I haven't used this product on woodwork but I have used it on some antiques with satisfactory results. Try a small section of woodwork in a hidden corner of a room as a test to see if you like the results. Check with an Ace Hardware Store. I think they carry Formby products.

If that doesn't yield the results you want, then the next level of attack is to strip the old varnish. The good news is that old varnish strips easily--much more easily than paint. Heat from a heat gun or heat plate will not work on varnish; you'll need to use a chemical stripper. My choice of stripper for varnish is Klean Kutter from a company called Klean Strip. (Very clever with the Ks, don't you think?) Lowe's and Home Depot stock Klean Strip products according to the company's website. I like this product for varnish because it is thin and cuts through varnish better than thick paste strippers. But those strip-

pers work better on paint where Klean Kutter won't do much to strip paint.

Brush on the stripper and wait a few minutes until you see the finish bubble up and then scrape off the goo with a putty knife. Follow up by rubbing down the wood with a coarse steel wool (#2) dipped into a little stripper. Before applying stain (if you want to enhance or change the color of the wood) or the top coat finish, wipe down all the surfaces with a clean rag dampened with mineral spirits to clean and neutralize any stripper residue.

I am sure I don't have to caution you to be careful with this procedure--but what the heck--I'm going to be a nag anyway. Protect any surface you don't want stripped and ruined. Mask off those areas with sheets of heavy plastic and duct tape. Lots of old newspapers will help absorb any stray liquids. Protect yourself, too. Wear heavy rubber stripping gloves (available at home centers and hardware stores) and a long sleeve shirt. Protect your eyes with goggles. Make sure you have lots of ventilation so you are not breathing air thick with toxins. And be careful to avoid any fire hazards. Read and follow label directions for any product you use. (Whew, now I feel better that I got that out of my system.)

(Next Month: Staining and top coating woodwork and a different prescription for refinishing a front door.)

# Doc on the Block

#### What is jaundice?

Jaundice is caused by an increased amount of yellow pigment called bilirubin in the body. Bilirubin comes from the normal breakdown of red blood cells. Newborns are prone to an increase in bilirubin because it takes about a week for their liver to efficiently process the pigment and send into their intestines.

There are several types of jaundice. Physiologic jaundice occurs in more than 50% of babies. The jaundice starts on day of life 2 to 3, peaks at day 5 to 7 and disappears by two weeks of age. It is usually harmless. Breast-feeding jaundice occurs when the baby is not nursing well or not getting enough milk. It occurs in 5% of babies. The baby's bilirubin levels can go much higher than with physiologic jaundice. Breast-milk jaundice occurs in 2% of babies and can last 1 to 2 months. A substance in breast milk causes the baby's intestine to absorb more bilirubin back into the bloodstream. This type of jaundice is harmless.

Sometimes if the mother and baby's blood types are different, there can be antibodies from mom that break down the baby's red blood cells and cause increased production of bilirubin. This can be a more serious type of jaundice.

When babies have jaundice of any type it is important that they feed well. Having bowel movements helps the

body get rid of the bilirubin. Both breast-fed and bottle fed babies should feed often. If the bilirubin levels get too high, then the baby can be treated with phototherapy. A specific wavelength of light helps the body process the bilirubin more quickly. This is used with a special lighted bassinet or belt that the baby wears.

Jaundice is usually harmless but if the bilirubin levels get above 25 or 30, the baby can develop deafness, cerebral palsy, or brain damage from staining of the brain by the pigment. This, fortunately, is not common. Most babies are treated with phototherapy to keep their levels below 20 to 25. Ask your doctor if you're concerned about your baby having jaundice.

# 200 Attend Neighborhood Safety Meeting

n Wednesday, April 2nd, friends and neighbors of the Dundee Memorial-Park Association attended a forum on safety at the Dundee Elementary School Gym. The main purpose was to reinvigorate existing neighborhood watches and take volunteers for starting new ones. Restarting the Citizens' Patrol in our area, dormant for over seven years, was also discussed.

Speakers included Councilman Jim Vokal, Omaha Coalition of Citizens' Patrols(OCCP) President Chris Costantakos. Also on hand from the Omaha Police Department's (OPD) Northwest Precinct was Capt. William Rock and Crime Prevention Specialist Bridget Fitzpatrick.

Ms. Fitzpatrick explained that your block must do several things to be recognized by the city as a neighborhood watch block. First, a captain must step forward and be willing to visit neighbors and gather contact information (phone and email). The neighborhood block captain is not necessarily the same person as the Flower Basket block captain. Second, a minimum of sixty percent of residents on the block must be willing to participate. Once this is done, the block captain would contact their Crime Prevention Specialist to schedule an orientation meeting. Bridget Fitzpatrick (444-6478) is responsible for the area North of Dodge Street. Contact Pam Ehrhart (444-7928) if your block is South of Dodge.

According to OPD, our neighborhood currently has 37 active watch blocks. Councilman Vokal stated that he'd like to see that number double. Nearly thirty attendees of the meeting registered to learn more about the program—a great start! If you weren't able to attend, please contact your OPD Crime Prevention Specialist today and volunteer to captain your block.


Chris Costantakos of OCCP discussed the patrol program, and its success in other areas of Omaha. She stated that patrols are not to be confused with vigilantism. Participants merely witness suspicious activity and report it to OPD for follow up. This program requires that volunteers complete an evening of certification training. Magnetic signs reading 'Citizen's Patrol' are placed on side and top of patrol vehicles. There are typically two persons per patrol vehicle, and patrols run on Friday and Saturday nights.

Remember that even the smallest crimes must be reported. OPD Capt. Rock stated that he hears people at public meetings say that they didn't want to bother the police. "We're in the busi-



ness of being bothered", Rock said. Dial 911 for emergency and 444-5600 for non-emergency call.

Please consider volunteering for Citizens' Patrol or as a block captain. You can make a difference. Call me (Chris Kilroy-558-2111) if you need help getting started, and I'll point you in the right direction.



# **Voices From the Village**

Village Voices is a taped interview by Ward Peters with neighbors within the DMPA community transcribed by Bonnie Price. Humane Society Volunteer, Chris Tracey is this month's Village Voices.

What brought me to Omaha was my husband, Richard, who had just received a very nice job at Brandeis, the old Brandeis downtown. It was very difficult for me because I was left behind to sell our house in Springfield, Massachusetts and we had four little kids, 11 and under.

I was very unhappy and I did not want to move. I had to look at a map to see where Nebraska was and which states bordered it. That was 1967. Same home for 40 plus years. I love it now. I do believe I am the oldest on the block.

The neighborhood was very appealing. Both of us loved it because of the mature trees. It reminded us so much of New England. Of the four homes Richard had narrowed it down to we purchased the most expensive-\$37,500. You can't beat these old houses. Brandeis was a huge help because they had tradesmen down there that Richard got to know and they did a lot of work here in the house.

We moved in around Halloween of 1967. School had already started. Our youngest was barely two years old. The kids walked to Dundee School back in the days when there was no lunch program...so they would come home at noon and go back after lunch...a healthy walk...using the underpass on Dodge Street.

So initially I stayed home with our youngest, worked on resurrecting the house and during our first year a neighbor and I were having coffee talking about what we could do about the loss of all the Dutch elms. We contacted the city forester, Orville Hatcher, and he gave a talk to many of the neighbors living on South 53rd Street between Farnam and Jackson. It was a community project, most everybody cooperated and was excited about having a planted tree for \$75 each to replace the diseased Dutch elms. They were small but they grew quickly, like two inches in diameter each year and they all survived until '97 and then boom, boom, boom, many of them came down in the big, wet snowstorm.

I could not say enough good things about our neighborhood. In the summertime we have a block party and the first Sunday evening in December the neighbors come together for the annual holiday party. Everyone knows the cars we drive, the dogs or cats we own plus we have an active Neighborhood Watch. It's very stable. Recently a house came up for sale on the block—prior to that it has been ten years since any turnover.

When Richard died in '91, I considered moving back to Boston where my two girls live. It was too expensive and I could not have lived nearly as nicely as I do nor could I ever afford a house like this in New England. I grew up in an apartment in New York City and I'll take a

big house any day. I love every minute and I think I use every room. I don't think I'd be happy with a small house.

What appeals to me about my house is that I can spread my wings and not have to worry about arrangement of furniture or inviting as many as 60 people over. It's an easy house to entertain in because it's got a nice flow. I'm not interested in selling but I'm delighted when young people knock on my door and indicate they would like to purchase my home.

My oldest daughter, Pam, was just here visiting from Boston, and we were reminiscing with my two sons who live in Omaha, Chip and Pete. They would get caught every once in a while as teenagers coming in at all hours of the night. Their father would hear them and they got caught a couple of times when there was a bed check in the middle of the night. One of the boys said, "Yeah, we used to crawl out of the window, jump on the landing, and shimmy down the post there." I'm glad I never knew that. My kids have fond memories of this house.

Once, Chip, when he was 11, was chasing Pam and our front door was open but the glass storm door was locked. She was in a hurry, missed the doorknob and went right through the glass. Our neighbor across the street, Dr. Gerald O'Neil, Pediatrician, happened to be home, jumped into his car and took her to Clarkson and stitched her up. To this day Pam has one remaining bad scar....she was terribly lucky that she did not hit any arteries.

On the lighter side, I'll never forget the Cleo story. They previous owners of our house moved to a house just one block north of Dodge, to 53rd and Davenport. Several days after they moved we heard this howling at the terrace doors and it was Cleo...their rather large, overweight Bassett. How she got across Dodge Street I'll never know. She must have stopped traffic going both ways. Anyway, it was fun but she finally realized that it was no longer her home.
