

oving on is easy. It's what you leave behind that is more difficult. After nearly 23 years of old house ownership, my

wife, Marj, and I have made the soul-searching decision to downsize. So the time has come after 18 years, 186 columns and more than 130,000 words (give or take a few hundred) to write the final Old House Mechanic column.

When I started writing The Old House Mechanic my plan was to write a monthly article for a year or two, but there was always something else to write about, some new problem posed by a reader to be solved or another story to tell about the joys and frustrations of living in an old house and the years just rolled by. (But, truth be told, I am almost always overly optimistic at estimating the time required for any project. My original idea was that we would have our old house renovated in 4 years or less and I missed that by a couple of decades!)

It is hard to leave behind everything we love about this neighborhood--the unique mix of architectural styles, the shady comfort of mature trees and the charming evening glow of our old-style streetlamps. But most of all, it is hard to leave behind all of you, the friendly, caring neighbors who make this neighborhood better than anyplace we've lived and likely better than any other place we'll go. If I had to put my finger on it, I would say the shared experiences of old house ownership and the collective will to sustain the distinctive personality of the Dundee-Memorial Park area creates a fertile soil for growing friendships.

As my final parting words, let me share with you what I consider the three most important lessons I've learned about old house renovation.

#1: The most important tool in your toolbox is patience. Glenn Haege who hosts a national radio talk show on home improvement called "The Handyman", says "the most powerful tool in your toolbox is your checkbook" and he's right, because we all have to hire help with our old houses at one time or another. But the most important tool for renovate-it-yourselfers is patience. If you slow down your work and don't try to rush through it, you'll be amazed at how much better your outcomes are. Over the years I have spoken with many old house owners, who tell me "I'd like to work on my old house, but I'm just not handy." But "handiness" is not genetic, it's learned. So I encourage you to try your hand on your old house projects. There are lots of how-to articles and videos on the web (including an Old House Mechanic archive at http://www.dundee-memorialpark.org/). Just try to be more patient with your projects and yourself. When you get stuck, walk away from the problem and sleep on it overnight. The solutions to many of my old house dilemmas have come to me when I took a break and started fresh.

#2: Old house renovation is the ultimate in living "green". If you're trying to live your life "greener", what could be a better recycling project than recycling an entire house? As this year's keynote speaker at "Restore Omaha", Donovon Rypkema, principal of PlaceEconomics, a Washington, D.C.-based real estate and economic development consulting firm, pointed out: "Historic preservation reduces the need for land and materials; reuses embodied energy, skills, labor and knowledge.; and recycles the whole building."

#3: We are not the owners of our old houses; we are just the caretakers. Sure, we are the owners in so far as we get to send monthly checks to our mortgage companies, but if we do our part to restore and preserve our old houses, imagine how many future families will get to experience our same happiness and joy in living and raising our families here. In New England, where I vacationed a few years ago, I noticed that many houses had the year they were built proudly posted on their fronts and many dated back to the 1800s, the 1700s and even the 1600s. Yet, as old as these houses were. families still lived and thrived in them. I see no reason why the solidly-built older housing stock in our neighborhood cannot last for centuries, too. The biggest thrills we have had while living in our old house have come from hearing stories about our house from previous owners and adults who were once kids growing up here. So as you maintain and restore your old house, think of the many generations who will someday enjoy your house the way you do. I think it will change your perspective.

The Old House Mechanic column will live on, at least in a fashion. Beginning next month and continuing until who knows when, the DMPA Newsletter will reprint past columns from the Old House Mechanic archives. I will be editing the columns to revise and update them as needed, because...well...because it's difficult to leave things behind.

Meet the Merchants

Italian Sausage, 600 Children, \$2.00/lb Cheese and an Annual Pig Roast

What do these have in common? Lou and Paula Hyland of Grand Pa's Food Store and Deli.

A month or so ago, I stopped in to see Lou (the Grand Pa of Grand Pa's) and he was elbow deep in making 50 lbs of fresh Italian sausage with his hand-crank machine. When I asked what made it Italian, he said "Tony Costantini's recipe" which calls for herbs and spices. Tony's recipe reached Lou the long way around; in 1954 Lou went to work at Grand Central Market, where Tony was a meat cutter – and sausage maker. Tony later bought the market, then even later, sold it to Lou, along with the Italian sausage recipe. This is how Dundee eventually acquired its very own meat cutter and sausage maker. Yes, Lou is a meat cutter, which explains how he can sell, on occasion, T-Bone steaks or New York Strips for \$5.99 per lb. These amazingly low prices have to do with a special buying relationship Lou has with his vendors, and the fact that he cuts and wraps his own steaks, and occasional roasts.

What is "Grand Pa's"? To be clear - it is a food store, not a convenience store. The difference is that Grand Pa's sells meats, cheeses, poultry, fruits, vegetables, freshly baked goods, and has a deli case with Paula's salads, sandwiches, and other deli items. There is so much that is made on site - in their commercial kitchen, that one of the best ways to shop there is just to come in hungry and see what they have. With respect to shelf items, when comparing his store to a large grocery, Lou explained, "We have almost everything, but only one brand of each thing." The other day a customer stopped by asking for ground ginger. Rather than turn the customer away, Paula shared some of her ground ginger, that she uses in her baking and cooking, by giving the customer enough to make the recipe she was preparing. "Why would I not give her some and help her avoid a long delay and an unnecessary drive to a supermarket?", said Paula. Customer service for Lou and Paula comes in many shapes and sizes, including the occasional home delivery.

While Lou makes sausages and cuts meat, Paula cooks and bakes, both for the store and for catering engagements. Paula describes her food as "old-style, family favorites" and has catered parties of up to 700 people. The catering menu includes Swedish meatballs, pork chops, lasagna, and roast beef -- a list of over 21 meat entrees and over 50 items total, including homemade breads and desserts.

Where do the 600 children come in? Lou and Paula over the years have been foster parents to over 600 children. Senator Gwen Howard sponsored legislation in the Nebraska legislature to honor Lou and Paula for their outstanding service to the community and to the foster parent system over the past several decades. "Many of the children," Lou says speaking of his huge foster family, "stay in touch with us. And the first thing they always ask when the

call or stop by is, 'Do you still go to Mt. Carmel bible Camp?" And for 40 years, the answer has been, "Yes."

'Lou and Paula have four children, "biological," as they said, and it was when three daughters decided to marry in the same year that Paula and Lou began their catering business, honoring the maxim of "necessity is the mother of invention."

And about the \$2.00 cheese? Lou can, on occasion, find wonderful bargains – he is a bargain hunter at heart. He may find a 30 lb block of cheese offered by a vendor that he can buy at a discount and resell at \$2.00 per lb, or a 20 lb pack of apples, or 20 lbs of potatoes. When he scores, he shares with his customers. Some customers do all their grocery shopping at Grand Pa's, saving money on the very competitively priced meats and produce, being flexible and buying what is available rather than coming in for the specific specialty item.

What about the Pig Roast? It is an annual event at Dundee Day. Lou and Paula roast a whole pig and sell it bar-b-que style in sandwiches, along with chips, \$1.00 sodas, and \$1.00 soft ice cream cones. Saturday, August 28 will be their 10th Dundee Day Pig Roast – but they expect to sell the whole pig, so don't wait too long to line up for your Grand Pa's bar-b-que.

With Spring Fling approaching, Saturday, May 22, Lou and Paula are planning to provide a special version of their pork bar-b-que for that event – so come and have a taste of Dundee's own "Grand Pa's Bar-B-Que" at Spring Fling.

At any time, whether during a special event or on just an ordinary day, stop in to say "Hi" to Lou and Paula; they are used to that kind of congeniality – and mention how much you enjoy the flowers and shrubs in their gardens around the store's parking. As I walked back up the street to Marks, I smiled at the tulips working their way toward the sun, and the forsythia bushes in bloom. Lou and Paula make great contributions to the neighborhood, and we are grateful for their presence.


