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## And Spring Fling Saturday 21st

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**I**t was the rolls of worn out carpet sailing off the second floor balcony and into the backyard. That was the first visible sign that this old house had new owners, or so our neighbors tell us. Among other features, it was the idea of beautiful expanses of oak flooring which attracted us to old house living.

But as we have learned, hardwood floors can be a blessing and a curse. The curse, of course, is the work and money it takes to restore them. So let me share with you what I call the Golden Rules (Golden Oak Rules?) of hardwood floors.

**Rule #1: Do-it-yourself and you may end up kicking yourself.**

I consider myself a brave do-it-yourselfer. Okay, if you insist, a foolhardy do-it-yourselfer. I've stood on top of my three story house replacing tiles, torn out and replaced thirty foot runs of galvanized pipe and low crawled through the attic to extend a cable TV coax cable, but I have never sanded a hardwood floor nor will I.

Here's why. The drum sanders used by professionals weigh in at a tad over 300 pounds. To operate one you better have a deft touch. If you pause even for a moment you'll sand scoops into your floor (called "drummers" in the trade.) Your old floors may have been sanded and refinished several times already, so there may only be a few fractions of an inch of wood left before you sand into the tongues and grooves in the flooring strips. So, don't be seduced by those D-I-Y magazines touting how easy it is to do this with rental equipment.

Luckily, there are several firms in Omaha who do great work. When you get estimates from any floor refinisher (or for that matter, any home repair firm) ask for references and then check them.

**Rule #2: With an old house, you don't have to go looking for work, it'll find you.**

Maybe you don't need to sand the floors at all. If the finish seems to be intact, the floor may just need a good cleaning. Use a soft bristle scrub brush, warm water, and a heavy-duty cleaner like Spic-n-Span. Work four to six feet square section at time and use lots of old towels to thoroughly dry each section after scrubbing. Water left standing on a wood floor can be disastrous. If there is a lot of built up wax on the floor try using mineral spirits to dissolve it. Remember mineral spirits are flammable, so make sure you have lots of ventilation and don't smoke.

**Rule #3: Your shoes are little sanding machines.**

Dirt, sand and all kinds of gritty materials stuck to your shoes and then scuffed across the floors will wear through the finish especially in high traffic areas. Get good mats for each doorway from the outside and then teach everyone in your family to use them. Consider taking off your shoes as soon as in you're in the house. Wood floors just love slippers, socks and even bare feet.

**Rule #4: Being a pack rat isn't always a bad thing.**

Salvage all old flooring boards because they may come in handy for a future repair or renovation project. When we pulled up the old floor in our laundry room almost the entire original floor had been replaced with plywood. But in the back of the closet we found several square feet of narrow-gauge oak flooring. We saved it and later used much of it to repair damaged sections of flooring in the sunroom.

**Quick Tip of the Month**

To hide light scratches in hardwood floors, try a wood stain pen. Like a magic marker, Min-wax makes these in several shades of stain so you should be able to get a good match. Another Min-Wax product I like is their rub-on polyurethane, which will also make some scratches disappear.

**Old House Source of the Month**

You can prevent most of those scratches in the first place by attaching felt pads to the bottom of anything that comes in contact with your hardwood floors. Pads are available at most hardware stores, but I like the ones sold by floor refinishers. They cost a little more but seem to be more durable.

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# Meet the Merchants

## Janine McClintock, Photographer

### “Documenting Your Love, Laughter and Life”

I found Janine McClintock high up in the loft of her studio tucked away in the old Le Marché space (next to the old Trovato’s space). With a cheery “Hi,” she welcomed me into her inviting, spacious, and immediately comfortable space.

Janine entered her career as commercial photographer nine years ago, leaving her job as elementary school teacher. Photography began as a hobby while in California, where she completed her schooling, and when she discovered how it fueled her passion, she changed careers. Now, she has teaching in her life in the form of rearing two children and sharing her life with her high school teacher husband, who encouraged her to follow her own path and discover what makes her happy. When describing her husband, Janine says with a big smile, “He has taught me how to be grounded.”

The way Janine began her photography hobby was to seek out a professional photographer willing to accept her as a volunteer assistant, meaning working those long “wedding hours” without pay. After quite a few refusals (which were hard to believe), she discovered Christa Hoffarth who, knowing her good luck, agreed to take her on, not only as an assistant, but more as an apprentice. One year later, with Christa leaving Omaha with her husband, Janine found herself losing her mentor. Christa counseled Janine to continue with her work and open her own studio. As Christa left town, she left Janine with a wealth of experience, advice and confidence to go out on her own.

When asked what she learned from Christa, Janine was very gracious, saying she learned everything about photographing weddings. At the same time, she learned something about herself. Rather than wanting only the “picture perfect” images, Janine wants to capture the reality of the treasured moments. The sign on her window reads, “Documenting Your Love, Laughter and Life,” and she truly means exactly that. She believes that when people are being themselves, they are so much more beautiful than when they are aiming for preserving the perfect image.

Janine loves shooting weddings. “It is such a big moment in their lives, and they are letting me in,” she said, emphasizing her appreciation for her clients’ trust in her. Her greatest desire is to tell the story “the right way.” In speaking of her photos, she says, “They are real life,” even if a bit nitty, gritty. She believes that is where the perfect moment lies. Based on a viewing of her albums, she is absolutely right. Along with the traditional posed (and picture-perfect) images, Janine, with an artist’s practiced eye, captures some stunningly beautiful, unposed moments.

She told me a story about shooting a wedding for a

client and among the images was an arresting and powerful image of an elderly gentleman, one of the guests. A few weeks after she shared the images with her clients, they returned to ask for more images of this elderly gentleman. They shared with Janine that he had died a few weeks after the wedding, and his family said it was the last – and one of the most beautiful – images that they would have of him. This is the “real” that Janine seeks out with every assignment.

When I asked what she did outside her photography, Janine quickly went into describing her second passion – running, which is turning into the triathlon combination of running, biking and swimming. She has run 10 full marathons and is registered for a ½ Ironman in Wisconsin this June. It is her first big triathlon, and even though it is a “half,” it is truly big. Not only is it a big event to experienced triathletes, but Janine disclosed how she recently learned how to swim – overcoming her fear of putting her face in the water for the first time. Laughing at herself, she said she had always been afraid to put her face in the water – and now she is training for a one-mile swim in the cold, open water of Wisconsin, wet suit and all!

Janine began running seven years ago when her father was diagnosed with leukemia. He is doing well now due to pharmaceuticals that had been developed shortly before his diagnosis.

The connection between her running and leukemia is the Team in Training (“TNT”) Organization, a non-profit committed to financially supporting the Leukemia & Lymphoma Society (“LLS”), a non-profit dedicated to finding a cure for leukemia, lymphoma and several other forms of cancer. Over the past seven years, through her running, Janine has raised over \$15,000 for the LLS. She not only participates, but mentors others in TNT events. The TNT is the world’s largest endurance sports training program with 40,000 runners, walkers, cyclists, hikers and triathletes participating in major marathons, triathlons, hiking adventures and century rides this year. Their banner reads: “Together we train to beat cancer.”

Back to Janine’s photography. With a strong foundation in film (meaning pre-digital), for which she is very grateful, she is totally comfortable in all the new technology. She does all her own processing, digital “dark room work” along with making all the artistic decisions: choosing the best images, and the best part of images, and choosing between color and black-and-white. When asked how she decides whether color or black-and-white is better for a specific image, she said, “I just know when I see it.” It is an

intuitive sense, and based on the images she showed me, she gets it right.

Janine has mastered the technology and enjoys using it at its best. In a comfortable living-room style setting, Janine projects her preview images on a large screen so clients can see every detail, and while viewing the images she has selected, she and her client share ideas, feelings, and history, all of which help Janine and her client create the story that will eventually go into the beautiful book that records the event and preserves the memories. I can imagine that enjoying the book years later would be like reliving the event, but with still images, which for me can be even more powerful than movies. It allows one to pause and share more detail about the people and events while looking at the moment that was a life-changing event.

While many of Janine's assignments are weddings, she also does family portraits, babies (in her studio's "baby loft"), portraits for people of all ages, high school senior pictures, and even pets. One of her most unusual engagements was photographing the birth of a baby. It was a C-section, and with the physician's consent, she recorded the event from the operating room. She said she asked herself at the time, "What am I doing here?" But she got some amazing images, just beautiful, and it was very important to both Janine and her client that she do it. She said, "If it is meaningful to someone, I would love to be there to help document it."

When I asked her why photography is important, she quickly responded, "Because people are important and it shows that they are important." She added, "It allows people to see themselves the way others see them, and placing photos on the wall says people are important."

I asked if she had ever been requested to photograph someone dying, and she said not yet, but thinks it could be a very important and beautiful collection of images. What she values most is the intimacy and trust that develops between her and her clients. As she said, she is passionate about people, and that passion becomes compassion, clearly evident in her imagery.

For someone who is constantly taking pictures in her mind, seeing all the world through a lens, and loving to share special moments with people, she seems to be in just the right place.
