Dundee Business Liaison Report

LOOKING AT THE BIG PICTURE

The merchants have been exploring two major initiatives designed to protect the business district, as well as beautify Underwood Avenue. The first is a Neighborhood Conservation and Enhancement Plan. This list of additional restrictions will be placed over the existing zoning requirements in the business district properties, and is based on the framework of the newly adopted Omaha by Design standards. It will limit the size of new buildings in Dundee and encourage uses that will be friendly to the neighborhood and pedestrians. The guidelines will affect development within property lines only. Also recently started is a Great Streets project along Underwood. This effort will look at street and public right-of-way issues including sidewalks, parking, signage, seating, etc. Work on this exciting project has just begun and a public meeting to generate ideas and to get public input is being planned for January, so please look for further announcements and plan on being part of the redesign of Beautiful Downtown Dundee.

Bill Stott with The Architectural offices had been coordinating the NCE plan while Molly Romero of Mark's has been coordinating the Great Streets effort. Both are being aided by Jed Moulton, manager of the City of Omaha's Urban Design Department.

BITS AND PIECES

A number of ideas are being kicked around by the merchant's, some are just ideas that may not come to

fruition, but others are being seriously explored and will hopefully benefit the business district and the residential neighborhood.

- Christmas lights will be going up in Dundee soon. The business district is looking into hiring a holiday lighting company to manage the installation of Christmas lights along Underwood this year.
- Recycling dumpsters are being looked into for the business district as well as the neighborhood. The idea is to place a recycling station on either side of 50th Street that would accept cardboard, paper, aluminum and plastic. Locations are currently being studied. These stations will need to be used by the entire neighborhood to make them economically feasible.
- Combining dumpster service for trash is being studied as well. A single trash collection contract could reduce costs as well as keep trash pickup to a single morning, unlike the current situation.
- The merchants are also exploring the idea of hiring an off-duty Omaha Police Officer to patrol the business district on weekend evenings. There has been a trial program running over the last several weeks, and the officer was able to keep a number of situations from getting out of hand.

Infinite Liquor License Denied


The Liquor Control Commission voted 3-0 to deny the liquor license applications for the Infinite Stores at 52nd & Leavenworth, 30th & Parker, Park Ave. & Woolworth and 33rd & Cass. None of this could have happened without the great legal work that Dan Rock provided. We owe him and his law firm a big thank you! It was also great to see so many neighborhood associations from around Omaha working together in a unified effort. We certainly get a great deal more accomplished working together. Although it took over 10 months to reach this decision, an important precedent has been set that the concerns of neighborhoods must be given consideration before liquor licenses are granted.

While this is a great victory, it may not be the end. Infinite Stores can appeal the decision to the Lancaster County District Court or they can start the application process all over again with the City Council. Given that the Liquor Control Commission voted two times already to deny these applications, it will certainly be difficult for for Infinite. We will have to remain vigilant in the coming months.

One positive result of this effort is a handbook that has been created by the neighborhoods and Project Extra Mile that provides an easy to understand explanation of the licensing process so that neighborhoods can be better organized when these issues come up. The handbook will be available through the Neighborhood Center and on their website.

Thanks to everyone in DMPA who voiced their opposition to these licenses. Special thanks go out to State Senator Gwen Howard for testifying before the Liquor Control Commission and Councilman Jim Vokal for his consistent support of the neighborhood's position.

t was just an off-the-cuff comment at a dinner party: D HOUSE countertops emit radon gas." Of "Well, you know granite Course, old house owners are generally used to dealing with

toxic dangers like asbestos and lead in old houses, but radon in granite? For any old house owners who have updated kitchens with granite, this is a new issue.

Apparently, the possibility of granite releasing radon first surfaced about ten years ago, but resurfaced earlier this summer in an article in the New York Times. So why should you be concerned? Radon is the second leading cause of lung cancer after cigarette smoking.

Radon gas is colorless and odorless and naturally created by the decay of radium in our environment. A certain amount of radon is always present in the atmosphere, but a concentration of radon gas above 4 picocuries per liter of air puts your family at risk for lung cancer. (And no, I don't know what a picocurie is. Apparently that was covered on the day I missed physics class in high school. But there are good, competent companies that can test for the presence of radon and measure the number of picocuries of radon in your air.)

But is it true that granite emits radon? When I want to determine the veracity of urban myths, popular legends or a crackpot email message, I turn to snopes.com. Snopes says: "It's not true that all granite countertops emit alarming amounts of radon. Most such countertops tested (by the Environmental Protection Agency) for this emission either registered no emission or in such small quantities that it was statistically insignificant. However, some granite countertops were found to emit not only measurable amounts of radon, but amounts at levels high enough to give one pause....Just how much of a risk this is to homeowners is a matter of debate, with some researchers pegging the cancer risk from granite countertops at 'one in a million'." The trade organization for the stone countertop industry is the Marble Institute of America. The MIA says that claims about the dangers of granite and radon are exaggerated and point a finger at the sellers of competing products for starting rumors. But in an effort to reassure the public the MIA is proposing testing to keep "hot" granites off the market, according to the New York Times. Some preliminary testing by a Rice University researcher of fifty-five granite countertop samples, found

that a handful of the samples tested at high levels of radon.

So what should you do? The short answer is: test your home for radon. Even if you don't have granite countertops, the EPA recommends testing for radon, because most of the radon gas in homes comes from the ground. Do-it-yourself radon testing kits are available from home improvement stores like Home Depot or general retailers like Target or can be purchased online.

Use three test kits and place one in your basement or the lowest level in your home, one in your kitchen near or on a granite countertop and one in a bedroom to establish a background level of radon. If the tests come back negative, then you don't have to worry. If the tests come back positive you should have your home tested professionally and then follow the advice of the testing company. Included among local companies that offer radon testing are: Home Buyers Protection Company, Foundation 2 Rooftop, Inc., Jerry's Basement Waterproofing, and SureHome Inspection.

And now—as Monty Python used to say—"for something completely different", here is another shameless plug for the window repair tutorial on the Dundee-Memorial Park website. 



It's That Time of Year Again.

We've been giving more FluMist this year than in year's past for a number of reasons. Several studies have suggested that FluMist gives longer and better protection than the influenza shot. I'll try to answer some of the common questions that parents have about it. More information is available from the CDC, my source for much of this data. Does it prevent influenza? Yes, in one large study among children aged 15-85 months, the nasal-spray flu vaccine LAIV (FluMist®) reduced the chance of influenza illness by 92% compared with placebo. Who can get the FluMist? LAIV (FluMist®) is approved for use in healthy people 2-49 years of age who are not pregnant. Who can't get the FluMist?

- People less than 2 years of age
- · People 50 years of age and over
- · People with a medical condition that places them at high risk for complications from influenza, including those with chronic heart or lung disease, such as asthma or reactive airways disease; people with medical conditions such as diabetes or kidney failure; or people with illnesses that weaken the immune system, or who take medications that can weaken the immune system.
- · Children <5 years old with a history of recurrent wheezing

 \cdot People who have a severe allergy to chicken eggs or who are allergic to any of the nasal spray vaccine components.

How many doses will they need? Children 2 years up to 9 years of age getting a flu vaccine for the first time will need two doses of vaccine the first year they are vaccinated, with the first dose ideally being given in September or as soon as vaccine becomes available. The second dose should be given 28 or more days after the first dose. The first dose "primes" the immune system; the second dose provides immune protection. Can children who get FluMist pass the vaccine virus to others? Yes, but the current estimated risk of getting infected with vaccine virus after close contact with a person vaccinated with the nasal-spray flu vaccine is low (0.6%-2.4%). Can my child get sick from the FluMist? Not really. Unlike the flu shot, the nasal spray flu vaccine does contain live viruses. However, the viruses are attenuated (weakened) and cannot cause flu illness. The weakened viruses are cold-adapted, which means they are designed to only cause infection at the cooler temperatures found within the nose. The viruses cannot infect the lungs or other areas where warmer temperatures exist. Some children and young adults 2-17 years of age have reported experiencing mild reactions after receiving nasal spray flu vaccine, including runny nose, nasal congestion or cough, chills, tiredness/weakness, sore throat and headache. Both FluMist and the influenza shot are safe and effective options to help you and your child decrease your risk of catching influenza. Ask your doctor about protecting your children from this miserable illness today!
