details of his funding proposal, recently passed by the City Council, where \$550,000 in project money for the 2012-2013 budget cycle will help to fund the streetscape project. Following approval by the Design Review Board, the project will move to the working drawing stage where final details and budget will be developed. The Merchants Association will then be in a position to seek funding and develop a construction schedule. This redevelopment will not occur overnight but it is good to see progress and forward thinking.

A new restaurant is set to open this month in the Underwood Avenue business district. PITCH, a high end coal-fired pizzeria, will have its opening, I am told, during the second week of November. The kitchen equipment has been installed and tables in place. As I walked by a few days ago I saw a fire burning. We are pleased to welcome this new dining choice to the neighborhood.

I also noticed the posting of the closing notice for the Reniers Piano Store on Dodge Street for the end of the year. You may recall that Matt Dougherty and Michael Alley spoke at our October meeting last year about their plans for remodeling that building. I assume that we will see the project begin after the first of the year.

Look for the ugly, yellow signs to come down on the Infinite station at 52nd and Leavenworth. New management has been cleaning and remodeling the space. They have told me they want to create and manage a neighborhood friendly business with a new name. Call or write me with any suggestions.

Our speaker for the November Association Meeting is Hal France, Executive Director of The Kaneko, the new arts development and presentation organization and space in the Old Market. Hal tells me their support goes beyond the arts, to creativity in any field. We welcome Hal, former Music Director of Opera Omaha, as he presents plans for the development of this exciting, new venture.

Again, I remind you that I continue to seek your suggestions for programs of wide interest that will attract you to meetings. Please call or write with your ideas and do include the names of knowledgeable presenters. I am looking at programs dealing with geothermal HVAC, financial planning, the Gerald R. Ford Conservation Center, and the Durham Western Heritage Museum for our spring meetings. What are your thoughts?

Pedestrian nodes will narrow the street and include benches and planters to help make the area more pedestrian friendly. Additional trees and public art may also be added features.



nticipating winter is a like a second marriage: a triumph of hope over experience. Every year, about this time, we start hoping for a mild winter, but experience

teaches us that, like it or not, soon we will be dealing with winter with ice on the roads, snow on our sidewalks and, if we are quite unlucky, an old house with a frozen water pipe. Ice on the roads? I can't help you. Snow on your sidewalk? You'll have to scoop that yourself. But I can offer you a few tips of dealing with a frozen pipe.

The first and best solution for your pipes is to keep them from freezing in the first place. Most pipes freeze in outside walls, unheated crawl spaces or in undersink cabinets. Pipes under a sink are vulnerable on really cold nights due to a combination of tightly closed cabinets blocking heat from the house and uninsulated or poorly insulated exterior walls. The solution is to let some heat inside the cabinet either by cutting some ventilation slots or just opening the cabinet door on the coldest nights.

For pipes in exterior walls or unheated crawl spaces the best solution—but easily the most expensive—is to reroute the water line to bypass unheated areas. Another option is to wrap the pipes with heat tape. If you use heat tape that is thermostatically controlled you'll conserve electricity. Heat tape is pretty easy to install, just follow the directions carefully. Remember that you are essentially wrapping an electrical wire around your pipes, so make sure you don't cross the tape over itself and only plug into a grounded GFCI protected outlet. Once installed, heat tape should last for years. In my old house I have pipes running to my laundry room through an unheated crawl space. I installed heat tape on the pipes years ago (yes, I was tired of crawling into the crawl space to thaw out pipes) and it is still working just fine after 20 years.

As a pipe freezes the expanding ice can exert as much as 2,000 pounds of pressure so a ruptured pipe is quite possible. If you're unlucky and this happens, shut off the water to that pipe (and if you can't isolate that pipe, shut off the water at the main) and call the plumber. If you're lucky and the pipe hasn't ruptured you can start thawing. First open the faucet at the end of the pipe run. Then trace the pipe back to the unheated area: a crawl space, an exterior wall or an unheated basement area. Apply heat (I'll tell you in a moment what kind of heat so stick around for that) to the pipe starting at the end closest to the faucet and working back from there. The reason you start at the faucet end is so the ice that is turning into water and steam has an escape route and doesn't blow out the pipe or a plumbing fitting.

Never use anything with an open flame to thaw a pipe like a propane torch, a large bonfire or a flamethrower. Using an open flame device can a) start your house on fire, or b) poison you with carbon monoxide, or c) heat the water

in the pipe too rapidly causing it to boil and the pipe to explode, or d) all of the above. Some advise wrapping the pipe with a rag and pouring boiling water on it, but this is really messy and it is easy to scald yourself. If you choose this method never pour the boiling water directly on the pipe.

The best choice for thawing pipes is a powerful hair dryer or a heat lamp. If the pipe is close to a wall, place a cookie sheet between the pipe and the wall to radiate heat back toward the pipe. This will speed up the process. Inside a cabinet a portable heater will solve the problem in a jiffy.

If the frozen pipe is not directly accessible (e.g. behind a wall) you have a decision to make. Your first option is to cut a hole in the wall, floor or ceiling surface material; thaw the pipe and then, of course, face the repair work to close up the hole. Your second option is warm up the interior area near the frozen pipe. The second method naturally will take longer. You can accelerate the thaw by placing a portable heater or an infrared lamp near the location of the frozen pipe. Don't place the heater any closer than 18 inches from the surface and clear away any flammable material. Be patient. Thawing a pipe this way will take awhile, but it will work.

But you may not need any of these options; because this could be the year we have a really mild winter. Yeah, sure.

Midtown Neighborhood Alliance Report

The pilot projects for Re-Tree Midtown were very successful. A wide variety of new trees were planted the last week of September by Indian Creek Nursery along 52nd Street between Underwood Ave. and Davenport St. Special thanks to the Kiewit Foundation, OPPD, Mayor's Neighborhood Grant and the Midtown Neighborhood Alliance for providing the funding that allowed these trees to be planted at no cost to the homeowner. As we move into winter, we will be looking at additional streets to do future plantings. The Midtown Neighborhood Alliance held its second annual Celebrate Midtown fundraiser at Joslyn Castle on October 23rd. Proceeds from this fundraiser will go to projects like Re-Tree Midtown that are sponsored by the MNA.

Infinite Store Update

First, you may have seen that several former Infinite stores, including Park Ave and Woolworth, were granted liquor licenses in September. DMPA supported the efforts of our fellow Midtown Neighborhood Alliance member Ford Birthsite Neighborhood Association. That decision by the Nebraska Liquor Control Commission has been appealed to the Lancaster County District Court by the Ford Birthsite neighborhood. That case will not be heard for probably six months but it will have a dramatic impact on neighborhoods and their efforts to be heard.

DMPA was contacted by Ferra, Inc. which said it is going to be the new operator of the former Infinite store at 52nd & Leavenworth. The property will remain owned by Mohammed Ali (who has failed to pay property taxes the past 2 years) and it is unclear how much he will be involved in the operations of this store. This was not a surprise since Ferra, Inc. had told another neighborhood association that they "owned" the 52nd Street store back in May. In the intervening five months, Ferra, Inc. did not do any upkeep of the property prompting DMPA to write a letter to Councilman Jerram asking that the City take action. As a result of that letter, the overgrown weeds have been cut back.


There remain serious problems concerning the underground gasoline tanks on this property. The Environmental Protection Agency and the Nebraska State Fire Marshal are proceeding with legal action against the property owner because of his failure to comply with numerous orders to correct serious violations.

Ferra, Inc. has made no decision at this time on whether it will sell alcohol at 52nd & Leavenworth. They have said that they will not try to get a liquor license at 33rd & Cass because of the trouble it causes. One would think that the same would hold true for 52nd St. Ferra, Inc. currently holds a liquor license for a convenience

store at 103rd & Fort St. Ferra, Inc.'s license was suspended earlier this year for illegally selling alcohol to minors and it was also given an Enforcement Warning in July by the Nebraska State Patrol. The property had overgrown weeds and was not well-maintained when Ferra, Inc. was operating it That store has been closed since the end of August. This certainly is not a very good track record.

As was done last year, there is a petition in opposition to a liquor license at this location. If you are interested in signing, please let me know at drschinzel@hotmail.com<mailto:drschinzel@hotmail.com>.




