## **Dundee Day 2008**

t starts about 5:30 in the morning. Pat Gobel is making hundreds of gallons of coffee. The Pancake man is laying out the grill. Volunteers are putting up tables, filling syrup bottles and moving equipment. As is traditionally the case a few cars are towed and display tables end up in the wrong place but by 8:30 all is well for another Dundee Day celebration.

August 23, 2008 was a glorious day for a celebration and Dundee did it up just right. The parade went off without any major hitch (remember last year?). The

crowds were large and enthusiastic. I have never seen so many double strollers in my life! Chip Maxell, on the spur of the moment decided to do his radio show in front of Dundee Bank. Kids and dogs joined in the fun in large numbers and it seemed like more events were designed especially for children. Adults seemed just as happy as the kids. Music played through the afternoon into the evening. What is sometimes amazing is how there is something for everyone at Dundee Days.

All of what makes Dundee Days so special would not happen without the volunteers, the merchants and the

## **Making Omaha Better**

Omaha is one of 772 U.S. communities identified by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) that needs to address its sewer systems to prevent the release of untreated sewage into waterways during wet weather.

This mandate means we must replace our combined sewers or install other systems to control releases of sewage into the Missouri River and the Papio Creek.

The City of Omaha, engineers, community groups and citizens have been meeting to look at ways to meet the new federal regulations, including considerations for both non-monetary concerns as well as cost-effective solutions.

Community acceptance of the proposed clean solutions is a very important aspect of the work being completed.

veryday we are reminded how the high cost of D HOUSE of almost everything including old house renovation. A couple of weeks ago I asked the clerk at

the special order counter of a local home improvement center for a price on a wooden storm door. The price he shot back to me of \$329 didn't seem out of line, but I was completely taken aback when he added, "And the freight charges will be an additional \$240." Ouch. For that kind of money I could buy the door its own airline ticket! (And a cocktail and in the in-flight movie.) So I am resigned to repairing my old door.

This experience got me to thinking about ways to save on repairing or updating an old house without having to cut corners. Here are a few ideas.

You may be able to find the building materials you need at a steep discount if you look in some unusual places. For example, try Craig's List. If you're not familiar with Craig's List, it is a free online want ad section. Craig's List started in San Francisco but has grown to cover almost every city in the country including Omaha. Even if you know about Craig's List you may not know there is a section called "Materials". In this section you'll find all kinds of building materials for sale—maybe just what you need. You can find the local home page at http://omaha.craigslist.org/. Then just click on "material" under "For Sale". And if you are looking for used appliances, click on the "Household" section.

Another off-the-beaten-path source for building materials is Habitat for Humanity's ReStore at 1003 S. 24th Street (one block south of Leavenworth). Habitat accepts donations of surplus building materials and then sells them at their store to support their mission of building homes for low income families. They will also accept donations of your surplus building materials and reusable salvage. If you are tearing out cabinets or fixtures that still have some life in them, give Habitat a call. They will be able to tell you if they can use what you have. This keeps a lot of building material out of the landfill. You can take the tax deduction for the donation and it's good for your soul. Everybody wins.

Bear in mind, however, that most contractors won't work with surplus or used building materials for liability and warranty reasons. But for work you're doing yourself, you may be able to save some bucks.

Even if you don't have all the skills to tackle a complete renovation job, maybe you can do part of the job and save some bucks. As an example, I split some roof work recently. Tree limbs crashing down in a storm had peeled the small back porch roof off our house. I replaced it with a standing seam copper roof. I have neither the tools nor the skill set to bend cooper panels, but I was able to rebuild the wood understructure and then hired McKinnis Roofing to apply the copper. The roof looks great (if I do say so myself) and I saved over a thousand dollars.

Usually, it is the initial work or the final work that is easier for a homeowner to take on. An old house owner friend of mine reminded me that projects in newer houses take much less time because you don't have to first undo old remodeling work first. If you're up for a little demo work you can save the money you would pay to a contractor for undoing old work.

Let me hasten to add a couple of cautionary notes, though. If you are tearing into walls make sure you know what's inside the walls. It could be a disaster if you cut into electrical wiring or a water supply pipe. Also, if you are taking out a substantial portion of a wall make sure it's not a load-bearing wall. If you're not sure about these things, then leave the tear out work for your contractor. You may be better suited for the finish work. If you are reasonably skilled with a paintbrush, perhaps you want apply the finish to the woodwork and paint the walls. Or maybe you don't mind doing the cleaning up. You may be able to save several hundred dollars by doing a daily task the contractor hates anyway. Of course before you divvy up any work you'll want to negotiate the details with your contractor.

If you have some money saving ideas for old house renovation work, let me know. And, if you happen to be driving back from upper Wisconsin and wouldn't mind sharing your car with a 7 foot door, definitely give me a call.

## Midtown Neighborhood Alliance Report

The Midtown Neighborhood Alliance met on August 20th at the Field Club.

State Senator Gwen Howard announced that she will be donating canvas grocery bags to neighborhoods to distribute this fall as a way to reduce the use of petrole-um-based plastic bags. She will also be offering \$100 gift cards to Hy-Vee this holiday season to neighborhoods if they are willing to match the \$100. The neighborhood associations would then determine who in their neighborhood is deserving of these grocery cards.

It was announced at the meeting that the proposed graffiti ordinance to require homeowners to pay for the clean up of graffiti would be withdrawn after considerable neighborhood opposition. There was also discussion about the on-going fight over the Infinite liquor licenses. The representative from the Omaha Police at the meeting expressed serious concerns about what has been going on at these Infinite stores and he thanked the neighborhoods for standing up against these licenses. DMPA continues to oppose the license for 52nd & Leavenworth thanks to the continued help of Dan Rock.

The Midtown Neighborhood Alliance will be asking the City of Omaha to begin the process of creating an Area of Civic Interest (ACI) overlay for Dodge Street from 49th Street to 24th Street. DMPA has already gotten the City to create an overlay for Dodge Street from 49th to 51st. This is a tool that the City hopes will set design standards along Dodge that prevent unsightly strip malls and the demolition of historic buildings.
